Welcome to the <u>SOGICA project</u> newsletter, with an update on our work since the last newsletter in July.

Call for participants

Our main news is that the fieldwork phase of the research is underway, and we have begun to hold interviews with asylum seekers, advocates and decision makers as part the project pilot. We are circulating a flier in <u>English</u> and <u>Italian</u> calling for project participants and would be grateful if our newsletter readers would pass it on to anyone who might be interested.

We are particularly keen to talk to asylum seekers or refugees claiming on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity. We would also like to interview people who work with or support SOGI asylum seekers and refugees, including lawyers, service providers, judges and NGO staff. Interviews will be held on a strictly confidential basis and we will give potential interviewees <u>full information</u> about the research to help them make up their minds about whether to take part.

The fieldwork is taking place across Europe: <u>Carmelo Danisi</u> is leading the Italian case study and anyone who would like to contribute to the Italian case study is asked to contact Carmelo, who will be based at the University of Bologna. Recent and forthcoming events

On 4 September, Nuno Ferreira gave a presentation on *Seeking asylum in Europe: Delving into sexual orientation and gender identity asylum claims*, at the <u>UACES</u> <u>47th Annual Conference</u>, Jagiellonian University, Krakow, Poland.

SOGICA members are participating in several events in the autumn, including a workshop at the <u>Sussex Rights and Justice Research Centre</u> in November, a Sussex University workshop for an edited collection and journal special issue on 'Feminist and Queer Perspectives on Brexit' also in November, and the <u>Queer</u> <u>Migration conference</u> at UCL in December.

Life stories

<u>New accounts</u> of LGBTIQ asylum seekers' experiences have been posted on our website every week, most recently <u>the story of a Libyan refugee</u> in Italy who is now working to help other LGBTIQ refugees.

New database items

We've added many new items to the database, including new European case law such as the recent <u>Opinion of AG Wahl in C-473/16</u> and NGO resources, such as the film <u>The Abominable Crime</u> about the plight of Jamaican LGB asylum seekers. And a new addition is the compilation of <u>Italian case law on SOGI asylum</u> put together by Carmelo Danisi.

- A new collection edited by Jude Boyles, <u>Psychological Therapies for</u> <u>Survivors of Torture: A human-rights approach with people seeking asylum</u>, explores overarching issues such as interpreter mediated therapy, assessment, and working with trauma and shame. It also looks in detail at the particular needs of specific client groups such as LGBT survivors, women, separated young people, and families.
- 'Our friends in Bologna, the association Avvocatodistrada, have organised a series of trainings and information events on Homelessness and LGBT+. - On 27 September, the Move On Roundtable event on <u>Integrating migrants &</u> refugees into the labour market took place in London, providing insights into the ways in which the integration of refugees and migrants is held back, and what needs to be done to overcome these barriers.

 And finally, in early October, after many people mobilised against <u>the</u> <u>deportation of Nneka Obazee</u>, it was reported that Virgin Air had refused to fly Nneka to Nigeria. Good news although we wait to hear the final outcome of Nneka's struggle for protection!

<u>SOGICA</u> – Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity Claims of Asylum: A European human rights challenge (2016-2020)

This project, funded by the European Research Council (ERC), explores the social and legal experiences of asylum-seekers across Europe claiming international protection on the basis of their sexual orientation or gender identity (SOGI). Focusing on Germany, Italy and the UK as case studies, the project aims to determine how European asylum systems can treat asylum claims based on the claimant's SOGI more fairly.
